MRS. SARAH MORRISON

Sarah McCosh was born in Laverne-shire, Scotland, January 28, 1840, and was married at the age of 21 to Richard A. Morrison, who died September 29, 1885.

She was a pioneer of Newaygo county, having moved here with her husband in 1867, since which time she made her home on the same farm.

She was taken ill about a year ago and suffered a stroke of paralysis October 7. She did not regain consciousness. She died Sunday morning, October 11, at 2 o'clock.

The funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 from the family residence near Brunswick. Rev. J. F. Bowerman officiating. Interment in Clark cemetery.

Mrs. Morrison was the mother of eight children, six of whom are still living, namely, Robert, of Vassar, Mich.; Norman, Alonzo and Albert, of Brunswick, and the Misses Sora and Margaret, of Chicago. One son, Amzo, was electrocuted in Muskegon July 17, 1913, but owing to his mother's condition, she was never informed of his death.

She is also survived by a half sister, Mrs. John A. Rutherford, formerly of Fremont, who now resides in Lowell, and a sister in Scotland.

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OLDEST PERSON IN MICHIGAN.

Thomas Rooney, Who Died at Fremont on
Tuesday at the Age of 109.

FREMONT, October 14.—Thomas Rooney, who
died here yesterday was without doubt then
the oldest person in Michigan. He was born in
Lothian County, Ireland, August 26, 1785, and
was at the time of his death 109 years, 1 month
and 17 days old.



At the age of 45 he emigrated to America with
his family and settled in Ontario, where he
again became a tiller of the soil. In his twenty-
five years' residence there he made and lost a
fortune. In 1872 he came to Michigan to live
with one of his daughters whose home was in
Holton Township, Newaygo Co. Three years
ago he came to Fremont, where his grandson,
Mr. Arthur Morrison, resided. He was quite
active until last spring when he suffered from
la grippe, and had gradually failed since then.
He was the father of fourteen children, four of
whom are now living.
